Your son/daughter will have a job at All City Candy this semester. All City Candy, located in Richmond Heights, is a new jobsite for our MTEP work crews. At All City Candy, student workers stock, clean, and organize the store. They will also have many opportunities to interact with customers.

As part of an MTEP work crew, students are asked to wear a uniform (work shirt), follow directions in the workplace, and communicate with store/community personnel.

Students will work at All City Candy for approximately go minutes a day, 3-4 days a week.

- -Practice following verbal directions such as stop, get, look, put in/on, push etc.
- -Help your children with safety skills such as crossing the street, buckling his/her seat belt and closing the car door.
- If possible, take your children in the community with you to decrease anxiety and increase exposure to members of the community.
- Point out employees in the community who are considered safe to approach (i.e. store clerks, police officers, and restaurant servers).
- Encourage your son or daughter to locate items in grocery/retail stores.
- Vizzle is an interactive web-based program for visual learners that can be used at home. If you are interested in utilizing VizZle, please contact MTEP Speech therapists or teachers and request access to lessons that help teach vocabulary, language concepts, as well as Community Explorers protocol and expectations.

Visual Instructional Mode (VIM):

Visual cues used for the purpose of comprehension, that are imposed as an alternative to, or in conjunction with, speech.

Ex.: word wheels, flashcards, written directions, visual stories, any visual to aid in comprehension of concept or content.






















Visual Scene Display





Grid based Topic Display - Directive or **Comment - singing**













































Visual Expressive Mode (VEM):

Visual cues used for the purpose of expressive communication.

Ex.: Topic boards, AAC devices, PECS, scene displays.

Why Video-Based Observational Learning?

- Takes advantage of the learner's
 - Visual processing capability over auditory processing
- Provides a variety of different behaviors in realistic contexts
 - Use multiple familiar people, objects, and settings

- Efficient and costeffective
 - Create once, replay as many times as needed
 - Consistency is built-in
- Students with autism favor viewing themselves in videos
 - Self-modeling





Video Modeling

(Dynamic Scene Cues)

- A method of teaching that uses video recordings or live video to provide a video model of instructions on how to carry out a task, behavior, or skill.
- Four types of video modeling
 - Basic: a video filmed of someone other than the viewer of the video performing a task or skill
 - Self-Modeling: the video is of the viewer performing the task or skill
 - Point of View: video is recorded from the point of view of the viewer
 - Video Prompting: consists of multiple steps to break down the task. Either the viewer or someone else can be the subject.

Tips and Strategies

- Visuals as well as hands on activities are essential and mandatory.
 Examples: hard copy hands, on materials that can be manipulated, video models for comprehension of instruction, computer interactive practice, visual reminders of sequence rules, highlighting
- Use fun engaging meaningful activities.
- Connect what you are teaching to what students already know.
