"Our son, Max (age 15), has been participating in Monarch's virtual school for the past school year. My husband and I would highly recommend this program. Aside from being nonverbal and on the autism spectrum, Max has several other health issues which prompted us to select 100% virtual school. Max participates in independent or small group, virtual classroom Zoom sessions with his teachers and therapists about 6 times throughout each school day.

Along with his academics, Max has occupational therapy, speech therapy, art, music, and gross motor time throughout the week. Due to Max's ability level and attention issues, I sit with him during his 6 daily Zoom sessions. I help the staff provide support, prompting, sensory input activities, and behavior management. The staff directs and implements all of Max's virtual lessons. I am there to assist as needed, and the staff encourages my input, suggestions and feedback on his progress. I feel it has really turned out to be a great collaboration! In the small group Zoom classes, there are students who require varying levels of support. Some of Max's classmates participate with complete independence.

Throughout the year, Max's teachers, assistants and therapists have worked diligently to provide Max with a quality and successful school program that really caters to his individual needs and interests. These Zoom lessons are presented in a variety of ways from teacher-led lessons on the computer, hands-on activities (e.g., cooking, cleaning, measuring), to social skills groups with peers. We have a set daily schedule, which also includes individual assignments and practice tasks that support his IEP goals and objectives. These assignments are posted in Google Classroom and can be completed independently throughout the school day or as homework. It really provides some flexibility and the ability to do tasks and practice assignments as many times as you want. The activities and lessons that Max's teachers and therapists have planned for Max really keep his attention by tapping into his interests, as well as working with his strengths and encouraging growth. For example, Max really enjoys going to the library and putting

books and DVDs in order. In Max's speech sessions, he is asked to answer questions, sort and describe pictures of his favorite characters, books and DVDs. He also puts images of his favorite DVDs and books in alphabetical order on a shelf in a library scene designed by his therapist. The staff does a great job of breaking down the curriculum into familiar, smaller tasks in order to maximize Max's attention, confidence and success. Max's teacher develops creative materials and implements lessons that really encourage Max to be engaged and actively learn. The team is so supportive providing materials, supplemental worksheets, manipulatives, task instruction visuals, and ideas to try at home. We cannot say enough about the dedication and caring the staff have shown Max. It is very apparent that careful planning and thought go into each lesson. Max has made such wonderful progress this year, and it has been an amazing opportunity for me as a parent, to witness him learn and achieve mastery of so many skills. Although he had been making great, consistent progress in years past attending Monarch School, I feel the virtual classroom with parent support has been a great alternative. Although in-person learning may be ideal for some students, the Monarch staff have gone above and beyond to encourage each child to succeed and flourish in the virtual classroom. "When Governor DeWine closed all schools temporarily due to the Coronavirus epidemic, Monarch School launched its distance learning program – an impressive feat considering the number of individual needs that had to be addressed and coordinated. We were impressed with the school's flexibility in meeting individual students where they were. Like Monarch, we made changes at home that have proven essential. There is one place in our house, the dining room table, where school takes place. The school day starts and finishes at the same time [everyday]. We have made one concession: a school shirt above the waist and lounge pants below.

Before we discovered Monarch, our son attended a virtual school for several years – so we are familiar with some of the downsides of an all-virtual experience. Monarch addressed those downsides through regular faculty engagement and program adjustments to the virtual world. We have regular contact with our son's teachers about maintaining an appropriate level of engagement while 'virtual.'
